Colorado QuitLine (1-800-QUIT-NOW)

A free resource for your patients, the QuitLine is a telephone coaching service that offers free nicotine patches to medically-eligible participants. The QuitLine tailors its services to meet the special needs of pregnant women.

Fax-to-Quit Program

This program offers health care providers a quick, efficient way to refer their patients to an evidence-based cessation service, the Colorado QuitLine. Baby and Me Tobacco Free

Physicians or clinics refer pregnant women to this program, which offers each mother four or more sessions of cessation counseling, support and CO monitoring. If, after random saliva tests, a mother tests tobacco free, she receives a \$25 voucher for diapers up to 12 months after delivery. There are 23 Colorado communities/clinics participating in this program. Nurse Home Visitor Program www.cdphe.state.co.us/ps/nursehome/index.html

The Nurse Home Visitor Program (NHVP) awards grants to public or private organizations in Colorado that provide regular, in-home, visiting nurse services to first-time, low-income mothers during their pregnancy and through their child's second birthday. The trained visiting nurses help educate mothers on the importance of health and nutrition and avoiding alcohol and drugs, including nicotine, and assist and educate mothers in providing general care for their children. Prenatal Plus www.cdphe.state.co.us/pp/womens/PrenatalPlus.html

Prenatal Plus is a Medicaid-funded program which provides case management, nutrition, and psychosocial services to Medicaid-eligible pregnant women in Colorado who are assessed to be at high risk for delivering low birth weight infants. The program assists women in developing and maintaining healthy lifestyles during pregnancy and beyond, especially encouraging tobacco cessation.

Medicaid Smoking Cessation Counseling Benefit

Medicaid clients can receive smoking cessation counseling through the outpatient substance abuse benefit. Providers are required to be licensed or certified addiction counselors and must be enrolled in Medicaid under that provider type. Prenatal providers cannot bill for smoking cessation counseling outside of global billing unless they are also enrolled as a Medicaid substance abuse benefit providers.
